Annual Performance Report 2020-2021

About Us

Canadian Parents for French is a nationwide, research-informed, volunteer organization that represents members across Canada and champions the opportunity to learn and use French for all those who call Canada home.

Canadian Parents for French was founded in 1977 by parents who wanted to ensure that children would have the opportunity to become bilingual in the Canadian school system.

Originally a small group of concerned parents who met in Ottawa, Canadian Parents for French has evolved into a proactive National Network with 12 Branches and offices and Chapters in local communities nationwide.

In 2020-2021, in light of the worldwide pandemic, Canadian Parents for French worked together as a national network to lead initiatives in support of Canadian parents and FSL learners, shifting our focus to virtual programming and sharing resources beyond geographical barriers. We stayed membership

fees for the year, to ensure equitable access for support to all parents despite their circumstances and saw a 100% increase in membership from 25,000 to 53,000 members.

President's Message



A nother successful year at Canadian Parents for French -Saskatchewan (CPF-SK) is in the books!

CPF-SK began the year with a Support Grant from PCH (Patrimoine Canadian Heritage) and a surplus carryover from the year before, mostly due to the continued restrictions to in-person programming. PCH has been very supportive and flexible during the pandemic, in terms of how their funding has been distributed and have allowed more creativity in programming. As a result, CPF-SK continues to find creative ways to use that funding.

PCH remains committed to the mandate and work of CPF across the Network and is appreciative of our efforts and cooperation that comply with their reporting practices (that's why we require Chapter reports in a timely manner!)

For those who attended any or all the Network Virtual Conference in October 2020 entitled, *Raise Your Flag for French*, I am sure you benefitted from the rich and valuable information from the workshops to the seminars to the evening concerts. As we move further into the virtual world (for some it feels as though we are falling deeper into it) we can expect to see more hybrid events to become available to our membership across the country. And although this allows more freedom to attend or watch later, there will also be an opportunity to attend in person, as health guidelines allow.

The Branch Board began the year with three Directors and has attempted to make recruitment a priority throughout the year. By December 2020, we received no response to our Call, made available on our Social Media page and the website. We have continued to keep the Call active, but with minimal response. The request for Directors remains active, and we would love to hear from you, or someone you know, as we seek candidates who are passionate about offering French Language Learning opportunities to all children across the province. Please reach out!

As the National Network continues to direct Branch Boards in various governance-related issues, Branch leaders attended a Network-sponsored virtual Leadership Training event hosted by the Canadian Society of Association Executives (CSAE). The workshop, entitled *Leading Together for Good Governance*, was very helpful in unpacking the various layers in Board and Organizational structures, including Board culture, personality types, ways to report minutes, and many more. As mentioned before, the value in a virtual model is that the content is usually recorded and available to 'watch later'. Those of us on the CPF-SK Board who were able, attended live, while the others watched the recording.

Concours d'art oratoire

Concours d'art oratoire continued to be a popular program that allowed French-second-language students to practice their researching, writing and oral presentation skills in French.

It was another record year of school level participation with more than 6,800 students presenting their speeches.

On March 17, 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of any remaining school and divisional finals along with the Provincial Final.

Concours virtuel 2020

With in-person *Concours d'art oratoire* provincial finals being cancelled across the country, students were invited to participate in *Concours virutel: Ensemble à distance.*

Saskatchewan students from kindergarten to grade 12 were invited to submit a one to three minute video of their experience at home through the beginning of the pandemic.

There were 38 video submissions from students across Saskatchewan.

Mary Joyce Booth Memorial Scholarships



Dr. Mary Joyce Booth was a devoted and enthusiastic educator, well known in Canadian Parents for French circles for many years before her death on March 22, 2007. She was passionate about promoting French-Second-Language (FSL) education. Dr. Booth was a professor of French in the College of Education, Department of Curriculum Studies, at the University of Saskatchewan

in Saskatoon. She endlessly supported opportunities for young FSL students. She also provided moral, professional, personal, and financial assistance to all levels of Canadian Parents for French over the years. Her interest in FSL initiatives started early; her passion for language was her life's work. This award honours her memory.

The criteria used to select the recipients is as follows:

- Each successful candidate will be enrolled in, or have completed, a grade 12 French program (or equivalent) and have the intention of entering a post-secondary program in the French language;
- The candidate should demonstrate excellence in their leadership ability; and,
- The candidate should display willingness to help others further their learning in FSL.

In a normal year, up to two \$1,500 *Mary Joyce Booth Memorial Scholarships* are provided per fiscal year. However, with expenses like travel being almost completely eliminated due to the pandemic, the Branch was able to provide three awards in 2020-2021.

Recipients included Malika Yoh from Regina, Shaelyn Vermette from Prince Albert and Nabil Brent Zanidean from Swift Current. Félicitations!

VIRTUAL FÊTE DU SOLEIL

The COVID-19 pandemic forced CPF-SK to adapt its popular *Fête du soleil* summer camp program. In trying to keep as much of the style of in-person camps, a new virtual format was created. Each day's Episode or Do-It-Yourself Activity Guide for *Virtual Fête du soleil* still had a theme, vocabulary words, crafts, games, science experiments, exercise, and cooking activities - much like in-person camps. This new virtual format of posting videos to YouTube and the website with the theme's Activity Guide reached over 2,430 households. *Virtual Fête du soleil* was offered free of charge and open for all to access.

With 35 themes presented in July and August, there was French-language educational entertainment all summer long!

Resources

Created to Supplement Classroom & Online Learning

With the remarkable success of the *Virtual Fête du soleil* Program, an opportunity opened up to continue developing and offering virtual resources from September through to December 2020. Enabled by the generosity and support of Service Canada and the Canada Summer Jobs Grant initiative, CPF-SK was able to retain Melissa Longworth, the Lead Bilingual Monitor, for an additional four months of employment. This extra time allowed for the creation of an additional five themed learning packages, each containing activity guides, a selection of games and video clips, for youth.

And, just in time for the Holiday Season, a Christmas Parents' Resource Package was developed and released - an immensely useful tool for families looking to do French activities with their little ones during the holidays, and beyond!



Francofièvre

Planning meetings took place with the Association jeunesse fransaskoise (AJF) to adapt *Francofièvre*, given the COVID-19 situation. *Francofièvre Remixée* went entirely virtual with artist's performances being taped and available to schools and students throughout the month of May. In addition to the recorded performances, schools also received a pedagogical kit and swag bag. This year's performers were Ponteix, C'est ma cousine and Lunch Krew.



FRENCH-SECOND-LANGUAGE EDUCATION WEEK

More than 8,506 students actively celebrated socio-cultural activities, planned in more than 23 schools (20 French immersion, 1 core French, 2 virtual schools), taking place in areas across the province from February 1-5, 2021. Schools that submitted a report to the Branch Office outlining the activities they organized were entered into a draw for a grant to be used to hold a cultural event. Winning schools were: 1st place - École Centennial School in Swift Current received a \$500 grant, 2nd place - École Alvin Buckwold School in Saskatoon received a \$250 grant and 3rd place - École Holy Cross School in Prince Albert received a \$100 grant.


New Website

With the pandemic still ever-present in October 2020, the in-person CPF Network Conference initially being organized to take place in Edmonton could not occur. Instead, the "Raise Your Flag"-themed event was adapted to a virtual format. Over a six-day period of time, the more than 359 registered delegates were treated to a variety of informative and thought-provoking sessions. Whether it was *A Fireside Chat* with Clara Hughes, a look into the future with JP Michel regarding *How To Prepare Your Teen For Jobs That Don't Exist Yet*, or global adventurer and award-winning filmmaker Elia Saikaly's take on

Empowering Students Through Adventure, the attendees were impressed by the scope and range of workshops presented to them.

There was something for everyone! A sampling of all the workshops

that took place included: looking at long-term solutions to challenges being felt within FSL education; sharing social media ideas; dissecting the hybrid model of online teaching and learning; understanding the literacy loop in oral language development in French immersion and core French; and, outlining strategies for implementing the CPF Strategic Plan 2020-2025.

A total of 12 delegates attended from Saskatchewan. And, a further shout out to CPF-SK... two different episodes of the Branch's *Virtual Fête du soleil* Program were aired per day, for the duration of the Conference, to delegates and their families.

CPF ADVOCACY IN ACTION Modernizing the Official Languages Act

On February 19, 2021, Official Languages Minister Mélanie Joly released her government's plan to modernize the Official Languages Act in a reform paper titled *English and French: Towards a substantive equality of official languages in Canada.*

In its response to the PCH Vision Reform Document, CPF applauded the Government of Canada for its leadership in promoting the equality of both the status and use of English and French in Canadian society. Also recognized was the establishment of modern legislation, regulations and policy tools that would ensure equitable access and delivery of services of both official languages. CPF affirmed that everyone in Canada should have the opportunity to fully participate in the public life of our bilingual country.

The Government of Canada's approach to official languages acknowledged the diversity of Canada's linguistic landscape and need for the continued collaboration with provincial and territorial governments to increase the national bilingualism rate from 17.9% to 20% by 2036. CPF agreed that the federal government must work with provincial and territorial governments to ensure that more Canadians become bilingual in the future. Next steps and recommendations were also outlined.

Following this release, CPF National was able to secure a one-hour meeting on March 17 with the Minister to discuss the new OLA Reform Document. A total of 24 CPF volunteer and staff representatives were able to attend. including the CPF-SK Vice-President and Executive Director. Prearranged questions maximized the time spent with Minister Joly. Discussion points included: how the Act could be expanded to include more Canadians; solutions to wait lists; expansion of "rights to education" for French immersion, as it is often referred to as an optional program; strengthening powers to enforce the Act; broadening the scope of the Commissioner's role to include public education-related matters, and recruitment of French teachers.





The goal of the meeting was to discuss individual experiences linked to the new investments of the Action Plan through the Official Languages Support Programs. The objective of the exercise was to enable the Department to take stock of the first two years of the implementation of the initiatives associated with the Action Plan's additional investment of \$500 million over five years.

This method effectively concentrated ideas and crystallized actions. To further increase collaboration, CPF National shared the session summary notes and any reading materials with the CoP when they met.

Two brainstorming sessions occurred, with the Executive Director attending both. Topics discussed included: Engaging Emerging and Youth Leaders in CPF (Pillar A) and What Measures are We Taking to Retain Members? (Pillar B).

Chapter Development Officer Meetings

The Branch's Administration & Communications Officer participated in all Chapter Development Officer meetings.

New Branch Website Development and Training

The Branch's Administration & Communications Officer led the Branch's transition to the new website, participated in all training sessions, and now manages the site.

Virtual AGM

On September 19, 2020, the Branch held a Virtual Annual General Meeting (AGM) via GoToWebinar. With 14 attendees, important business to the functionning of the Branch was completed.

Normally a Chapter Planning Meeting (CPM) would have been held in conjuction with the AGM. However given that this was the year of the larger Network Conference, the CPM did not occur. This was due to the expanded format of the CFP Network Conference - extended to six days with much more opportunity for training and informational sessions to occur. 


