

Fête du soleil celebrates Saskatchewan

This year, La Fête du soleil has visited nine communities throughout Saskatchewan. Beginning with Moose Jaw, then travelling through Regina, Yorkton, Nipawin, Lloydminster, Estevan, La Ronge, and Prince Albert the summer day camp concluded in Saskatoon. Each event proved to be a success. Children entering kindergarten to grade five were able to make new friends, and practice their language skills in a fun and interactive setting through games, sports, crafts, music, science, nature and more.

What made La Fête du soleil unique this year was the celebration of the Saskatchewan centennial in French. Children had the opportunity to participate in the creation of a mural with multiculturalism as its theme. The aspirations of these children, their thoughts about multiculturalism, and their love for the French language were expressed in a huge traveling mural that will be presented at the Legislative Assembly. Saskatchewan's leaders will be invited to take a look at the final product and grasp the importance of linguistic duality to children in communities across the province beginning at a very early age.

The monitors, bilingual university students, played an important role in each event with their experience and enthusiasm as well as their facility with the French language. There wouldn't have been the same enthusiasm and spirit at the camp if it weren't for these energetic young people. As for the parents, once again Fête du soleil was indeed a good investment in their children's future! Congratulations everyone!



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Concours d'art oratoire 2005

On April 30, 2005, 100 finalists along with their families and friends converged on Saskatoon for the provincial final of Concours d'art oratoire. This competition was the culmination of months of preparation for over 4000 French immersion and core French students from grades 1-12 representing 18 school divisions across the province. Researching, writing, practicing and presenting French-language speeches has given them all valuable experience in using their second-language. Students presented their speeches in their classrooms and in their schools. Students from grade four and older competed within their school divisions. First and second place winners from grades six and up came to Saskatoon to compete for a provincial medal. Prizes were given to grades 9-12 winners including books donated by Bouquinerie Gravel. As a result of their provincial success, Kyrie Irwin-Kristmanson, Samra Sahlu and Daniel Detillieux travelled to Ottawa for a weekend to represent Saskatchewan at the national level. Congratulations to Kyrie for placing second nationally. And special *félicitations* to all the participants, and the teachers and parents who supported them for their efforts in presenting such high quality speeches.

Gaining an appreciation of the arts and culture are an intergral part of learning a language. This year's line up includes music and danse, storytelling, improvisation and a ventriloquist. Workshops are varied with la *Troupe du jour* providing proffessional instruction in theatre to heritage fairs showcasing francophone history in Saskatchewan. The Clin d'oeil is back for a 17th year in 2005-2006.

Intensive French in Saskatchewan

Saskatchewan students have the opportunity to experience an exciting new second-language learning program. Intensive French began in 2002/2003 in two classrooms in St. Paul's R.C.S.S.D. #20 in Saskatoon and is generating interest province-wide. Due to the success of the program, intensive French is expanding to Moose Jaw Public S.D. #1 and Prince Albert R.C.S.S.D. #6 in 2005/2006. Several other school divisions are exploring the possibility of implementing an intensive French program for 2006/2007.

Intensive French is an enrichment of the core French program by the creation of a period of intensive exposure to French which enables students to receive up to four times the number of hours of instruction normally devoted to core French in one school year. During the intensive period, all activities relate to the learning of the second-language; no content objectives for the other subjects are evaluated through intensive French. The teaching strategies focus on interaction and group work, helping the students to communicate orally in French.

The intensive French program is offered for the first five months of the grade six year. Instruction is carried out in French from 60% to 75% of the day. Subject instruction in English makes up the remaining daily instruction time.

In the second five months, students study their English subjects (English Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, Health, Math etc.) with the exception of an enriched core French program. This program incorporates the teaching and learning strategies of intensive French and is aimed at maintaining and further developing second-language skills. Compacting the curriculum for other subjects to five months requires a review of the learning objectives for these subjects to identify skills, cognitive processes and content which could be introduced during the intensive French period activities. This introduction gives the children some awareness and latent knowledge so that skills, cognitive processes, and content for other subjects can be covered more quickly during the second five-month period.

The student's oral and written proficiencies were evaluated and the results have been extremely positive. The oral proficiency of students was evaluated through an oral interview administered by

trained interviewers and scored according to a rating scale used in other provinces.

The students in Saskatchewan scored at a level in the oral evaluation that indicated they "are able to sustain a conversation using short phrases and sentences; demonstrated emerging spontaneity and some ability to create with language". This is an amazing result given they have only been studying French for five months.

To evaluate their written proficiency, students wrote a composition that is used to evaluate grade three Francophone students in Québec. The compositions were scored in Québec according to a number of specific criteria. In the written evaluation, students scored at a Francophone grade level of approximately grade three on fluency and accuracy.

Intensive French students acquire a higher level of competence in oral and written French in five months. To maintain students' motivation to continue studying French and to enable them to build on what they have acquired, some type of specialized follow-up is essential. Currently, funding has been made available for teacher training at national symposia for both intensive French and follow-up teachers. The Official Minority Language Office (OMLO) of Saskatchewan Learning is committed to continue supporting intensive French and the follow-up program through the development and adaptation of resources at the local level. OMLO personnel are also collaborating with a national committee to develop resources for the follow-up to intensive French. These initiatives will ensure quality programs for the students of Saskatchewan.

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
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Équipe Saskatchewan, what a success! *Un franc succès!*

French for the Future 2005

On April 26, 2005, French immersion and Francophone high school students gathered in 18 cities across Canada to discuss the importance of bilingualism and biculturalism as part of the eighth annual French for the Future conference. Over 3,400 students participated in French for the Future in Kelowna, Vancouver, Whitehorse, Iqaluit, Calgary, Edmonton, Yellowknife, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Regina, Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Sudbury, Halifax, Charlottetown, Fredericton and St. John's. At a time of increased international cultural tensions, students across Canada came together to explore the benefits of communicating in both official languages.

Regina hosted its second French for the Future event this year. The program was held at the Institut Français at the University of Regina, and was focused on the theme "Saskatchewan 100 years". Workshops included music, the art of interviewing, the role of the French language in Saskatchewan's history, along with a guided tour of the University of Regina campus and a quiz celebrating Saskatchewan's centennial at the end of the day. Saskatoon's event was held at St Thomas More College and featured workshops on song, improvisation and leadership along with a guided tour of the campus and finishing with the Saskatchewan centennial quiz.

French for the Future is a non-profit, student-driven, educational program. Since its inception in 1997 with 200 students from eight high schools, French for the Future has grown to include 18 cities across Canada involving over 3,400 students from approx 200 high schools. French for the Future promotes the learning of French as a smart career move, uniting French immersion and Francophone communities and providing students with a positive French environment in which to practice their French-language skills.
