The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Elmer Hynes Award to Maureen Young of CPF-Moose Jaw chapter.

Chapter and board members continued with their meetings on Saturday. René Archambault, Executive Director of FELB offered insight into how funding for FSL programs in Saskatchewan is distributed. Jim Shea spoke with enthusiasm of CPF-National initiatives and encouraged Saskatchewan CPF members to keep on working to promote FSL opportunities for the young people of Saskatchewan. The afternoon was spent reviewing chapter activities and initiatives.

# Distance Education for French Immersion Students

Saskatchewan French immersion students have the opportunity to take distance education courses via eCOLE: l'école d'éducation à distance. Following the closure of Collège Mathieu's virtual school, the French Education and Languages Branch (FELB) perceived a need for this mode of delivery. Thus, in September of 2003 eCOLE was born. Originally offering 10 courses with 23 students enrolled, eCOLE has expanded in both areas. The 2005-2006 year had an enrolment of 56 students in 17 courses. For the current 2006-2007 academic year, students can choose among 22 classes. Not affiliated with Collège Mathieu, this secondary distance education school is housed within the French Education and Languages Branch of Saskatchewan Learning.

To be admissible, students must be enrolled in a Saskatchewan French immersion or regular stream school. Approval to attend eCOLE must be received from the school the student currently attends. The base school makes available a contact person who supervises the student and provides administrative support. In addition, the school must have Internet access and a computer with a CD Rom drive for the student's daily use. Most computers are already equipped with the software necessary for the class work. However, *FirstClass* is needed to enter the virtual school.

*FirstClass* is a communication and collaboration platform that features email, public folders, contacts, conferences, a centralized directory, group collaboration in conferences, instant messaging, and calendars. This software provides the virtual educational environment for eCOLE. Without it, students cannot receive assignments, communicate with others or complete the course. Licenses have been purchased on behalf of the students and schools need only to install it on the appropriate computer.

The distance education delivery mode meets a variety of student needs. eCOLE enhances and complements existing French programs by providing courses which may not be available at the local high school. The school can provide an option for timetabling conflicts and for students unable to physically attend a course due to illness. In instances where the French immersion secondary program has been eliminated, students can complete all of the courses required to graduate with a mention bilingue.

Elective and compulsory courses are offered on a semester basis. All have a definitive start and end date with no classes available in the summer months. eCOLE's classes cover the mandatory 100 hours of workload. Each meets the curriculum guide objectives and conforms to provincial requirements. Students can expect a variety of assignments for each course. These include group projects, reflective portfolios and independent assignments to name a few. As in a traditional class, students must successfully complete all assignments including final exams in order to pass. Final marks appear on the student's regular transcript with the appropriate amount of credits as determined by Saskatchewan Learning.

The French Education and Languages Branch of Saskatchewan Learning is committed to supporting French learning programs. This includes exploring new technologies and alternate modes of delivery. As Saskatchewan demographics change, more efficient and effective ways of accommodating students in their educational pursuits must be examined. # Concours d'art oratoire 2006

## Provincial Final Results



Concours d'art oratoire is an annual French-language public speaking event sponsored by Canadian Parents for French. Students in French second-language programs prepare speeches and present them in their schools. Grades 6-12 students may represent their schools and school divisions at the provincial level, and Grade 11-12 provincial winners proceed to the national level of the Concours.

The 2006 edition of Concours d'art oratoire was a resounding success. Across the province 4,750 students presented speeches to their peers and teachers. School competitions were followed by divisional finals. The Provincial Final was held on Saturday April 29th at St Thomas More College at the University of Saskatchewan giving students and their parents an opportunity to visit the University and compete in a spacious and welcoming facility.

French immersion students were well represented. Organizers were pleased with the continued participation of core French students from around the province. Wawota, Nipawin, Carrot River and Lloydminster all sent speakers in the core French category. Saskatchewan was capably represented at the national finals in Ottawa on May 27, 2006 by Laura Laverdure (francophone), Katelyn Fréçon (Core French) and Janna Moats (French immersion). Congratulations to all the participants for their efforts, and to teachers, administrators, judges and parents for their support.

# French-Language Debate

Are you looking for a fun and engaging activity to get children and youth speaking in public, thinking critically and expressing themselves? Why not try French-language debate! The Saskatchewan Elocution and Debate Association (SEDA) is a non-profit organization with the mandate to assist anyone interested in learning more about debate and speech. SEDA promotes debate in English and French and offers free in-class workshops to any interested Saskatchewan schools – grades 6 to 12. A SEDA staff member or volunteer will spend the day in the school and visit a new class each period. Usually, each workshop session lasts about an hour and includes a presentation on “how to debate” followed by a mini-debate on a topic of the classroom teacher’s choice. Each student will get a chance to speak in a non-threatening atmosphere. Longer, more intensive workshop sessions with select groups of students or classes are also available.

Debate is an excellent teaching tool and addresses the following objectives:

- Encourages students to become empowered, critical citizens
- Engages students in subjects where the challenge is to deal with sensitive issues
- Uses language to communicate understanding, ideas, and feelings to assist personal development and self-expression
- Encourages thought about social values. Students hear both sides of an issue and develop opinions based on a multi-centric perspective, enabling solid value judgments
- Shows a constructive method of dealing with conflict and encourages respect for differing views.

SEDA coordinates extra-curricular debate for students in grades 5-12. Any school can form a debate club and participate in tournaments with other schools. In addition to holding debates in both French and English, SEDA offers a bilingual style of debate which incorporates both languages into the same debate speech. This exciting and uniquely Canadian strategic style is perfect for French immersion students. All a club needs to get started is two interested students to form the first team and a teacher or parent to be the coach/chaperone. Debate is often taught in school or students can get together with friends and ask a teacher, principal or parent to help them start a club. SEDA staff can come to the school for free and give a workshop to get started. From there they can put the debaters in touch with other coaches and debaters in the area. And resources are available from the SEDA website. Most clubs meet once a week and practice the skills of debate and prepare for tournaments. Each club pays a yearly membership fee of \$40 plus \$20 for each debater. The debate season starts in later September with training workshops. The regular tournament season continues until March with special events held from April to June. It’s up to the debater as to how competitive they wish to be. The important thing is that club meetings offer students the opportunity to debate and have fun!

# Institut français Bursary Winners 2006

For several years, Canadian Parents for French has been awarding \$500 bursaries to two students who have completed French 30 or a Type B immersion program in a Saskatchewan High School, and who are registered full-time in their first year at the Baccalauréat en Éducation française or in the Certificate in French as a second language program. These bursaries, administered by the Institut français at the University of Regina, are distributed once a year. The selection committee keeps track of academic achievement during the first semester of studies (50%), personal commitment to studies and extra-curricular activities in French (25%), and financial need (25%), and awards the bursaries based on these criteria.

This year, the recipients of these bursaries were Jeanette Peters, registered in the French second language certificate program and Kyla Schmiedge, first year student in the Baccalauréat en éducation program. Canadian Parents for French – Saskatchewan would like to congratulate both these students. Applications for this bursary are available from the Institut français.



# French for the Future/Le français pour l'avenir 2006

2006 marks the tenth year since the idea of French for the Future/Le français pour l'avenir became a reality. With the event now being held in 19 cities across Canada and with over 3000 French immersion and Francophone high school students participating, one can only conclude that this program continues to be highly successful and an excellent venue to demonstrate a commitment to bilingualism and French language education.

Along with Calgary, Charlottetown, Edmonton, Fredericton, Halifax, Iqaluit, Kelowna, London, Montreal, Ottawa, St. John's, Sudbury, Toronto, Vancouver, Whitehorse, Winnipeg and Yellowknife, Regina and Saskatoon also participated in French for the Future. Events took place across Canada simultaneously on Tuesday, April 25<sup>th</sup>.

In Regina, more than 80 students from Thom Collegiate, Campbell Collegiate, Martin LeBoldus and École Monseigneur de Laval participated. The event, held at Institut français on the University of Regina campus, included workshops in music, dance, radio and drawing. A tour of the University of Regina campus followed.

The Saskatoon group spent the day at Champêtre County, a French family-run ranch/event centre just north of St. Denis. Twenty-five students from six Saskatoon French immersion high schools were given an opportunity to spend a very unique day doing activities such as rope making, log sawing, nail pounding, egg throwing, buggy pulling – activities that are no longer commonplace. There was a hayride and a scavenger hunt. These activities were mixed in with more serious discussions on topics such as the French Identity in Canada. A person did not have to read the student's evaluation forms to confirm how much fun they had ... and the students enthusiastically spoke French all day!

French for the Future/Le français pour l'avenir carries a great deal of momentum as it moves into the future. The organization will continue to look at new methods to increase inclusivity, enhance programming, encourage Canadian youth to celebrate French language and culture, and emphasize the positive career potential resulting from French - language education in Canada.



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
